If you were an Ole Miss fan back in 2012, then you might remember the name Bo Wallace. Behind this former controversial quarterback, there is a story. Coming from a small town in Tennessee, Bo Wallace has made a name for himself.

Wallace was the starting quarterback all four years at Giles County High School in Pulaski, Tenn. Even though he won several awards and took his team to a state championship and had a 14-game winning streak, he was not heavily recruited.

One team that did recruit him was Arkansas State, which is where he signed because it was his best option.

At Arkansas State, Wallace would meet Hugh Freeze who, at the time, was his offensive coordinator but, in the future, would be his head coach. Wallace and Coach Freeze's time at Ole Miss together could be considered controversial with Freeze's scandals and the whole Good Bo vs. Bad Bo ordeal. However, Wallace got to be a part of a football program's turn around.

Wallace was able to attend a bowl game in all of his three years at Ole Miss. He had 9,534 yards passing with 10,478 yards total.

After his college career came to a close, Wallace went undrafted in the 2015 NFL Draft. However, after tryouts, he was invited to the Kansas City Chiefs rookie minicamp, but they did not sign him. It was not because he was bad, but it was because he could not keep up with the new, complicated play calling.

In 2016, Giles County High School had Wallace come help coach its football team. Only a year later, he was hired to be the quarterback's coach at East Mississippi Community College.

Now, Wallace is the offensive coordinator and quarterback's coach at Coahoma Community College. Here, he gets to coach his younger brother, Bryce, who is following in his brother's footsteps as a quarterback.
